## What do you know about ACTS Retreats?

An ACTS Retreat is a parishbased event that offers parishioners an opportunity to experience the love of Jesus Christ. This in turn fosters a desire for intentional discipleship. ACTS Retreats are given by parishioners for parishioners, and in this way, serve to build Christian community at a parish.

The ACTS Retreat begins on a Thursday evening and ends with Sunday Mass. While utilizing prayer, service, and teaching, the ACTS Retreat meets people where they are in their spiritual journey and invites them to experience God in a manner that is both personal and communal.

In this way, the ACTS Retreat fulfills the mission of, "Spreading the Gospel of Jesus Christ among Catholic communities through ACTS."

The ACTS Retreat experience is rooted in the Pascal Mystery in that retreatants are invited to reflect on the Passion, Death and Resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. Throughout the weekend, they are invited to prayerfully consider how they can respond to His love by spiritually surrendering to Jesus in order to have new life with Him. This invitation is

# All are invited to 'Knowledge of Faith' events

Next study begins in mid-January: 'Meeting Jesus in the Gospel of John'

September marked the beginning of a year of emphasis at St. Aloysius on "Knowledge of Faith: Encountering God in Scripture." Our first Great Adventure Bible Study, "Unlocking the Mystery of the Bible," engaged more than 150 participants in an eight-week study uncovering the story woven throughout Holy Scripture.

Small study groups met (and continue to meet) throughout the week, guided by facilitators, student workbooks and a series of videos featuring Jeff Cavins from Ascension Press. This engaging journey through the Bible brings focus to the profound connection between the Old and New Testaments, clarifying how the Sacraments, the Church and our entire Catholic Faith are rooted in Holy Scripture.

Our Speakers' Series also began in September, featuring acclaimed author and pilgrimage leader Stephen Binz on "The Grand Narrative of Scripture." In his talk, Stephen encouraged Catholics to focus on a broad, panoramic view of the entire Bible that illustrates the beauty of God's plan for the world. With a clear vision of this sweeping unity and purpose, we can better understand our own place within the storyline and our personal role within the mission of God.


Brian Pedraza, assistant professor of Theology at Franciscan University of Our Lady, spoke in October on the Church's understanding of Divine Revelation, mediated to us through Scripture and Tradition, as described in the Vatican II Constitution, *Dei Verbum*.

Brian's beautiful presentation explored how Holy Scripture is the product of both divine inspiration and human effort, interpreted and understood within the great tradition of the Church. He encouraged his listeners to follow the example of St. Augustine in his *Confessions*, to "take up and read" the Bible, and to experience how God transforms us in an encounter with the living Word.

In November our Director of Adult Formation, Mark Christian, gave an overview of the history and development of the Lectionary – the pattern of Scripture Readings used in Mass on Sundays and Holy Days throughout the year. He also introduced Cycle C in the


upcoming liturgical year, which focuses on the Gospel According to St. Luke. His presentation emphasized a key passage from the Vatican II Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy, Sacrosanctum Concilium, which inspired the modern reform of the Lectionary:

"The treasures of the Bible are to be opened up more lavishly, so that richer fare may be provided for the faithful at the table of God's word."

Our next Great Adventure Bible Study, "Follow Me: Meeting Jesus in the Gospel of John,' begin in mid-January. Registration forms are available now through the Church Office and on our website. It will follow the same format as the previous study, with small group facilitators, a student workbook, and videos featuring Edward Sri, a scholar with the Augustine Institute who is frequently featured on FORMED.

extended through the pillars of the apostolate:

- Adoration: A response to God's love through prayer and worship
- *Community:* Participating in the One Body of Christ as Church
- Theology: Deepening our relationship with God in order to better fulfill His will
- Service: Answering the call to discipleship by following the model He gave us

Those who attend an ACTS Retreat share in an experience that has impacted more than a million lives worldwide since the first retreat in 1987. There are numerous testimonies describing retreatants who were evangelized through a personal encounter with Jesus Christ. They witness to becoming better fathers, mothers, husbands, wives and children.

For me, ACTS has served as a scaffold for me to deepen my spiritual life. It was truly a leap

of faith for this off-the-scale introvert to commit to a weekend about which I had few details. The retreat was a very intimate faith experience that brought me to more profound personal relationship with Jesus. At the same time, I was surrounded by a group of men from St. Aloysius, each on his own spiritual journey. Through that shared experience, I developed a very special relationship with a community of men whom I had previously only known superficially and now cherish deeply.

was the The weekend beginning of a new direction for me. Over the past two years I have committed to the discipline of starting each day with prayer. I have found myself gathering with one group or another of St Aloysius parishioners, sometimes two or three times a week, to pray and lift each other up. I have taken advantage of opportunities for service that were previously invisible to me. All of these things are a part of my life now, not because I have to, but because I want to.

Within St. Aloysius Parish, this new evangelization has caught fire. Since it began here in 2016, more than 400 parishioners have participated in ACTS. Those 400 haven't been idle; they are committed to adoration, community, theology and service. You will see them serving throughout the various ministries at St. Aloysius. There are upwards of 50 to 60 parishioners at 6 a.m. Mass every Wednesday who were not there before.

Look around you at Mass. You will see many who have a deeper, more joyful, faith life because of this experience. Ask around. The return Mass for the next women's retreat is Nov. 18 at 11 a.m. Look at the faces of the women returning from that retreat and you will want some of what they have.

St Aloysius has four retreats each year, two for men and two for women. The next dates are *March 28-31 and Oct. 3-6, 2019*, for men and *May 30-June 2 and Nov. 21-24, 2019*, for women. The best way to learn more about ACTS is to speak with one of the 400. You can find many at 6 a.m. Mass on Wednesdays. Or contact anyone of the parish staff and they can point you in the right direction.

## Baby Bottle Campaign to aid pregnancy centers

The Dignity of Life Committee of St. Aloysius and the Knights of Columbus will launch the 2019 Baby Bottle Campaign Jan. 19-20 to aid our local crisis pregnancy centers.

We cannot say we are a prolife church if we do not care for them both. We love the mother and her baby. That is why we support our crisis pregnancy centers and their life-saving work. This year we are supporting two life-saving centers: The Pregnancy Problem Center and the Woman's New Life Center.

Both have been giving women in crisis pregnancies an alternative to abortion for many years and have saved many babies and their mothers from the nightmare of abortion. Both have free pregnancy tests and have ultrasound machines, so mothers can see their babies in their womb.

The PPC has a Mom and Me Shop to help clothe and feed both moms and babies and offers an Earn to Learn program to help moms and dads become better parents with healthier babies. The Woman's New Life Center offers professional counseling, educational resources and post-abortion counseling. The center also teaches Natural Family Planning.

Last year's campaign was very successful. We want this Baby Bottle Campaign to be the best yet, especially since we are helping two centers. Running each center is expensive, but you cannot put a price tag on the lives and souls saved. Please help us to offset their expenses with your donation.

October Show N' Tell let-


