Renowned commentator to speak at Lenten Mission

Raised in an Italian/Irish neighborhood in Providence, Rhode Island, Marcellino D'Ambrosio never thought about being anything else but Catholic. But like other Catholic teens, his faith was the last place he looked for fulfillment. Following in the footsteps of his parents, both professional performers in their single years, Marcellino set his sights on stardom, playing bass guitar in several popular rock bands by the time he was 16.

The father of five and a business owner, Marcellino brings to his teaching a practical, downto-earth, and humorous perspective that makes his words easy to understand and enjoyable to hear. He is a world-renowned commentator on Catholic issues, having

St. Aloysius serves as a member of the Interfaith Federation of Greater Baton Rouge, providing support to the federation's programs including the Holy Grill, the Community Prayer Breakfast, Christmas gifts for children of Holy Grill families and opportunities to meet members of other congregations.

The Holy Grill is the oldest of the programs, providing a hot lunch Monday – Friday in Zion City in north Baton Rouge. St. Aloysius volunteers serve lunch one week in the spring and one in the fall. 
BAPTISM: Please contact the Parish Office during early months of pregnancy. Baptismal preparation is required.

an uncommon wealth of knowledge on a variety of spiritual and theological topics. But his uncanny ability to make profound subjects understandable and relevant to everyday life makes him the perfect speaker for a wide range of events.

Marcellino laid his bass guitar aside and embarked on a road that led to a Ph.D. in historical theology from the Catholic University of America. His doctoral dissertation, written under the direction of the renowned Jesuit theologian Avery Cardinal Dulles, focused on one of the theological lights of the Second Vatican Council, Henri Cardinal de Lubac, and his recovery of biblical interpretation of the early Church fathers. His teaching has covered a broad range of subjects from historical, dogmatic and sacramental theology to evangelization, ecumenism and Vatican II. Yet throughout his academic career, he always remained deeply involved in pastoral work, especially teen evangelization and Hispanic ministry, assuring that his teaching remained relevant to the challenges of everyday life.

His writing has been published in the international journal Communio, Abingdon's Dictionary of Biblical Interpretation, the Tablet, Catholic Digest, Our Sunday Visitor and Catholic News Service's syndicated column "Faith Alive." His popular book Exploring the Catholic Church and video course by the same name (known as Touching Jesus Through the Church) have been used in hundreds of parishes throughout the English-speaking world.

Two of his most recently published works include 40 Days, 40 Ways: A New Look at Lent and When the Church was Young: Voices of the Early Fathers. Marcellino has also collaborated with Jeff Cavins and Edward Sri on a newly released study series from Ascension Press, Jesus: The Way, the Truth, and the Life.

His talks for the Lenten Mission at St. Aloysius on March 9-10 will be "Getting More out of Mass" and "Personal Prayer: Pathway to Joy." Make plans now to participate in this opportunity for Lenten renewal and inspiration!

objective, but the Church is the starting point. The journey isn't always easy, but our faith will keep us on the right path and give us the strength we need to reach our destination.





The school is named after the grandmother of our assistant principal, Sheri Harris Gillio. Mrs. Gillio had to recruit the help of her father in delivering two SUV loads of donated items to the school.

Dedicated 'Advent Crew' makes season brighter


