## Year 2 of Adult Formation Series ready to launch!

Our annual Adult Formation emphasis for 2019-20, "Experiencing God in Liturgical Life," will commence with two short, back-to-back studies starting the week of Sept. 15: "A Biblical Walk Through the Mass" and "Power and Grace: A Guide to the Catholic Sacraments." Another study, "Psalms: The School of Prayer," is scheduled to begin in January.

In the Catechism, the Church teaches us that the Mass is "the source and summit" of the Christian life (CCC 1324) and that all the Sacraments are related to the Mass as their true fulfillment (CCC 1211). "A Biblical Walk through the Mass" will introduce the rich scriptural texture of each part of this sacred service, while "Power and Grace" will explore more broadly the riches of the sacramental life





through which God nourishes and perfects us. These studies include student workbooks and a weekly video presentation, available on DVD and online by logging on to the Ascension Press website. Video presenters include Edward Sri, Father Mark Toups, Father Josh Johnson and the Dominican Sisters of St. Cecelia in Nashville

Grace" will explore more broadly the riches of the sacramental life the parish office and online at church.aloysius.

org. The combined cost for both studies – "A Biblical Walk through the Mass" and "Power and Grace" – is \$25. On the registration form, participants will be asked to indicate their preferences for days and times to meet. Tell us when you're available, and we'll find a group for you.

In addition to these studies, several Sunday evening speakers will explore a variety of themes related to our Liturgical life. Following the Sunday 5:30 p.m. Mass and a light supper, Olivia Gulino will consider "Liturgical Spirituality" on Sept. 22. Mark Christian and Ken Thevenet will delve into the Book of Psalms and its relation to Christ and the Liturgy on Oct. 20.

Make plans to participate in a study group and be present on these evenings as we sing and pray and think together about Experiencing God in Liturgical Life!

## St. Aloysius Stephen Ministry to Sponsor Caregiving Event

- I was 17 when the care giving began for my Mom, who was diagnosed with breast cancer.
- My husband, daughter, son and I care for my 87-year-old mom and 89-year-old dad.
- It started in 2003, when I put my life on hold to take care of my mother.
- I am a caregiver of my son, who is an adult with epilepsy.
- I began at the age of 14, helping my mom care for my grandpa, who was paralyzed from his waist down and had Alzheimer's.
- I am a young mother of an autistic 4-year-old boy.

Pages and pages of stories describe the arduous journey of caregiving on a link of the National Family Caregiver Alliance website. Thoughts pour from caregivers, illustrating the tasks and responsibilities of caring for a loved one or friend. Caregivers, young and old, wrestle daily with feelings of frustration, anger, sadness, joy, exhaustion, isolation and other emotions profoundly associated with the caregiving journey.

It's no wonder that these caregivers find their outlet in writing their thoughts on a link in a website. In the United States, the average duration of a caregiver's role is 4 years; 85% of caregivers provide care for a relative or other loved one; 42% care for a parent; 15% care for a friend or non-relative; 14% care for a child with a disability or impairment; 7% care for a parent-in-law; and 7% care for a grand-



parent or grandparent-in-law. Nearly one in four caregivers spends 41 hours or more per week providing care. (2015 National Alliance for Caregiving and AARP)

For some individuals, caregiving might occur gradually over time. For others, it can happen in an instant. Henri Nouwen reminds us that "to care is to be present to those who suffer, and to stay present, even when nothing can be done to change their situation." Staying present, however, is an oftentimes difficult road to navigate in the journey of caregiving, with so many demands and challenges encountered by a caregiver. And, more so, having to face a loved one every day who is suffering from a chronic illness, disability or experiencing prolonged pain can strain the lifeblood of a caregiver.

The St. Aloysius Stephen Ministry is sponsoring an event for caregivers entitled, "A Caregiver's Journey," given by Dana Territo, one of the Stephen Ministry Leaders. The presentation will take place from 6 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, Oct. 8, in the parish library and is open to all caregivers – daughters, sons, grandchildren, nieces, nephews, parents, partners and friends. Territo will present ways to

manage day-to-day caregiving tasks, as well as giving tips and strategies for the caregiving journey. Additionally, participants will explore ways to make their caregiving roles a meaningful and loving experience, both for the caregiver and care recipient. Light refreshments will be served and there will be opportunities to network with other caregivers and support resources will be available.

The St. Aloysius Stephen Ministry is a confidential lay ministry that supplements pastoral care. The program teaches lay persons to provide one-on-one care to individuals facing a variety of crises or life challenges, such as hospitalization, chronic illness, job loss, grief, divorce, cancer, financial difficulties or other life struggles. They are trained to walk with the care receiver on their journey to healing.


BAPTISM: Please contact the Parish Office during early months of pregnancy. Baptismal preparation is required.

#### **Parish Hall** gets updated projector system

With so many exciting upgrades happening around our parish, it's no surprise that the technology in our Parish Hall just got a major upgrade, too. Under the direction and leadership of parish IT adviser and consultant Bert Lousteau, IT Committee member Cletus Robinson and IT Committee chairman Andy Thibodeaux, the Parish Hall has a new, state-of-the-art projector.

St. Aloysius Parish is a vibrant community and when it comes By Gay Hebert to the many social events, meetings, or learning opportunities offered, the Parish Hall is where for Edie Boudreaux, Gay Hebert, many of these events happen. The previous projector was outdated, very dim and often difficult to see. An old incandescent bulb and low contrast levels made images look grayish and dull "Presenters had to lower the lights so that the screen could be seen, which caused issues if the audience also wanted to take notes," Thibodeaux said.

Additionally, the previous projector wasn't compatible with to-day's technology. "The old equipment required users to utilize old adapters to connect to an increasingly diverse set of IT tools, and we had no ability to present from wireless equipment like phones or tablets," Lousteau said.

The IT Committee determined the parish had a need for a new projector and was tasked with finding the right fit for the parish. The committee participated in several demonstrations at various price points to see which would best fit the needs of our parish. According to Lousteau, "We determined which projector met our needs to improve upon the brightness, presentation options, and contrast ratio at a price point that would provide the most value per dollar spent by the parish." Their recommendation was presented to Fr. Randy for approval and was implemented.

#### Come be a part of Children's Church

Children's Church is held on most Sundays starting Sept. 15 in the Parish Hall during the 9 a.m. and 11 a.m. Masses.

Children at Mass will be dismissed by the priest after a special blessing just before the Liturgy of the Word. They will return to the church just before the Liturgy of the Eucharist. No pre-registration is necessary.




## Music Makers a fun way for children to learn, play

July was a busy month of learning about outer space and camping and celebrating Inde-


