## National education group honors Father Randy

The Rev. Randy Cuevas, pastor of St. Aloysius Catholic Church, has been recognized as one of 13 recipients of the 2022 National Catholic Educational Association's Lead. Learn. Proclaim. Awards. The prestigious awards highlight outstanding work among Catholic educators and clergy across the country. Father Cuevas, one of only two priests recognized this

year, was honored during the NCEA Convention in New Orleans.

A 1970 graduate of St. Aloysius, Father Cuevas is the first alumnus of the school to serve as pastor of the parish, and that "full-circle gift" and commitment to mission were key factors in his nomination and winning of the award.

"As a servant leader, Father Randy

Cuevas has blessed St. Aloysius School and the diocese with his commitment to providing the best possible environment for students to be formed in the faith and educated for understanding it," said Dr. Melanie Palmisano, superintendent for the Catholic Schools Office.

"He understands the mission and is committed to its fulfillment," St.

Aloysius Principal Erin Candilora said.

Father Cuevas was surprised and humbled by the recognition. "Coming out of several very challenging years for all our Catholic school administrators and teachers, the award comes as a very 'happy' surprise, and I feel that it really belongs to all of them," he said. "A pastor with a parochial school is nothing without them."




## St. Aloysius presented with flag flown in Iraq

An American flag and Certificate of Authenticity were presented to St. Aloysius by parishioner and U.S. Army Reservist Major Patrick Downs during Sunday Mass on May 8. Downs serves in the U.S. Army National Guard and was deployed to Iraq from November 2020 to October 2021. The flag presented was flown in Baghdad on Easter Sunday and June 21 (St. Aloysius Feast Day) of 2021.

The certificate reads: "This is to certify that the accompanying American flag was flown at Forward Operating Base – Union III, Baghdad, Iraq on Easter Sunday and June 21<sup>st</sup>, 2021. Proudly flown in your honor and presented on behalf of the soldiers and Marines of Task Force Ramrod, 256<sup>th</sup> Infantry Brigade Combat Team, Combined Joint Task Force – Operation Inherent Resolve."

"People in the (St. Aloysius) community do so many things for us," Downs said. "The support was overwhelming, and it only seemed appropriate to fly the flag in the church's honor."



## Coming this Fall: The Great Adventure Bible Study

Starting mid-September, groups will begin the ten-week Great Adventure Bible Study, "The Prophets: Messengers of God's Mercy."

*If God's people had stayed close to him, there might have been no need for the prophets. God sent prophets at critical times to call the people back to their covenant relationship. Prophets proclaimed the consequences of continued sin, called people to repentance, and declared God's faithful love. They also spoke of the future to shed light on current events and to reveal God's plans and purposes.*

*It is nearly impossible to understand the work and the message of Jesus without the prophetic books. In "The Prophets: Messengers of God's Mercy," video presenter Thomas Smith examines who the prophets were, their role during their time, and the meaning of their messages for our own time. Discover how God is constantly calling you to a deeper relationship as well as the ways you are called to be the voice of God to others.*



## Mary Garden



# Spring service projects benefit those in need

During the spring, St. Aloysius School families cleaned out their closets and donated items to help animals and humans in need. Collecting used items also helps to save the Earth by keeping unwanted objects out of the landfills and finding new uses for them.


The fifth-graders collected used towels for the animal shelters in the area. Fifth-grade students designed flyers and posters to advertise the collection. As the towels were donated, students boxed them up in preparation for delivery. On Thursday, April 14, Ms. Nick's religion students loaded cars, and parent volunteers drove the towels to the Companion Animal Alliance Shelter on LSU's campus.

Sixth grade sponsored the 3rd Annual Phil Quartararo Soles4Souls Collection from May 3-6. Shoes in any condition were collected. Mr. Phil Quartararo was the father of sixth-grade teacher Debbie Michael and a proponent of this project.

Good shoes are distributed as is. Shoes needing some work are used in training youth in shoe repair. Shoes beyond help are sold for recycling and the money used to buy vaccines for villages. The sixth-grade students prepared the shoes for delivery.

The pre-K students collected gently used books during the week of May 9-13 to assist the St. Vincent de Paul shelters in their effort to expand their library of children's books. The pre-K students colored posters to advertise the event. They created bookmarks to be given to the children who will be reading the books. The entire pre-K class gathered in the Parish Hall to hear the story "Be Kind" and to discuss how collecting the books will help children who have no books to read.

St. Aloysius School will continue its mission to be kind to others, to animals and to the environment by sponsoring more collections next school year.



# SAS collects over 10,000 pounds of food

In 1990, St. Aloysius first began collecting food at All School Masses. This food is donated to the Greater Baton Rouge Food Bank. Since then, students, parents and faculty have been collecting food on a monthly basis. This tradition is now 31 years old. For the 2021-22 school year, students donated 10,425 pounds of food. This is enough to provide 8,688 meals.

So, how much food has St. Aloysius collected in 31 years? An amazing 331,137 pounds! Plus, because of damage caused by the Flood of 2016, an additional \$3,840 was donated to the food bank for restoration of their facility.

Next year, we plan to continue on our mission to feed the hungry in our local area.

## Troop 7 members earn Eagle Scout rank

Five Boy Scouts from St. Aloysius Catholic Church Troop 7 were awarded their Eagle Scout rank at a Court of Honor on May 20 at St. Aloysius.

Earning their Eagle Scout rank were Brady Eldredge, Griffin Gautreau, Nicholas Kolb, Brennan Normand and Liam Songne.

The Eagle Scout rank is the highest rank in Scouting. To earn this rank, a Boy Scout must complete requirements in the areas of leadership, service and outdoor skills. They must successfully complete specific tasks as they advance through the ranks of Scout, Tenderfoot, Second Class, First Class, Star, Life and Eagle.

They must also earn 21 merit badges, where the Scout must learn and demonstrate proficiency in a variety of fields of study. Of the 21 merit badges, 13 specific merit badges are required for the rank of Eagle Scout, including areas such as citizenship, first aid, swimming, cook-



ing, camping, communications, emergency preparedness and environmental sustainability.

Finally, each Scout must complete an Eagle Scout project that benefits his community and demonstrates leadership abilities. These Scouts led a total of over 400 service hours for their community during the completion of their Eagle Scout projects.

The projects included building signs for the Bluebonnet Swamp (Brady Eldredge); re-

furbishing basketball courts at Southdowns School (Griffin Gautreau); a research project for the LSU Military Museum involving the biographies of LSU students who died in World War I (Nicholas Kolb); construction of bridges for BREC hiking trails (Brennan Normand); and building of nesting boxes for endangered bluebirds installed at South Park in Denham Springs (Liam Songne).

## Stephen Ministry sponsors Lenten reflection event

On the Thursday preceding Holy Week, the St. Aloysius Stephen Ministry held an evening of prayer and reflection in the church. The setting for "Broken, Burdened, and Blessed" consisted of dimmed lights, five candles situated on the sanctuary, and a harpist playing soft reflective music that gave thoughtful contemplation for those in attendance. It provided a perfect segue for personal reflection going into Holy Week.

Each of the five candles signified something different: grief, hope, courage, love and life. The candles were each lit by parishioners during the service while Dana Territo, a Stephen Minister, read a passage for each one. The service started with Jan Breen lighting the first candle, the candle of grief, and afterwards, soft harp music played for personal reflection time. This candle was a reminder that we're not alone in our darkness; God provides the light.

Walter George Fahr, a retired colonel in the U.S. Army Reserve, lit the candle of courage, reminding us that courage is a process and the flame can light our way in having faith to remove our doubts and fears. The candle of hope was then lit by Margarete Moreau as Territo read, "Let this light be a reminder that we can be transformed through trusting in God and knowing we are never beyond healing."

Married almost 54 years, Bill and Ann Monroe appropriately lit the candle of love, and attendees reflected upon being open to receiving love as well as giving it, echoing what Jesus said in John 13:34, "Love one another as I have loved you."

The last candle celebrated life and three generations of the Roussel family; Jane Roussel (grandmother), Lindsey Roussel (mother), and Lillie and Davis Roussel (grandchildren). Territo read, "Let this flame reflect reverence for the past, strength for the present, light for the future, and inspiration and compassion through all our lives to sustain us as we share with all God's people; knowing we are all broken, but abundantly blessed."

As the flames of the five candles burned while music played, the program came to an end,

and attendees were reminded to embrace their brokenness or burdens they carry, allowing God to heal their wounds, and eventually discover the joyful reality and blessings of Easter and the Resurrection.

In times of great difficulties of life, in periods of crisis through loss, illness or grief, or other challenging times, a Stephen Minister provides support and encouragement with a listening ear while also lending emotional and spiritual support. Each specially trained Stephen Minister meets privately and confidentially with his/her care receiver, walking in prayer and support. Everything discussed with the care receivers, even their identity, is confidential. As Stephen Leaders emphasize in training sessions, "Stephen Ministers provide the care and God provides the cure."
