
The St. Aloysius Parish Fair returns Oct. 28-30 and we can't wait to share this exciting weekend with our St. Aloysius Family.

We are honored to serve as the fair chairs this year. This weekend is an amazing opportunity to spend time with families, friends and the parish commu-


nity. We want to thank the Fair Committee for the hard work and long hours over the past year to ensure that this year's fair is a success.

Upcoming study opportunity at St. Aloysius

Paul's first letter to the Corinthians addresses many of the same topics that appear in the news headlines today: scandals, promiscuity, debates and controversies, and issues related to prosperity versus poverty. Paul's messages to the Corinthians about divisions, immorality, persecution, and other trials offer much-needed wisdom for our own times.

School News: 8th-graders attend 'Come, Lord Jesus' retreat

The eighth-graders at St. Aloysius School participate in a weekly small-group program called "Come, Lord Jesus." This program is made possible because of the leadership of Jennifer Usher and Lissa Weston and the dedication of 32 volunteers. These volunteers give up one hour every Tuesday to spend time with their eighth-grade groups. They also spend untold hours preparing their group discussions by reading the upcoming Sunday's Gospel and making plans with their co-leaders.

The students began this year's program with participation in a mini-retreat during their religion class time on Tuesday, Sept. 13. Before the class came to Gonzaga Hall, Ms. Usher and Ms. Weston took time to prepare the leaders for the activities.

Students entering the atrium of Gonzaga Hall were led through a series of fun icebreaker activities, then given an explanation of the history of the "Come, Lord Jesus" program and an outline of the structure of a typical meeting day.

At the end of the activities came the moment of truth, students were given a clue to answer their two biggest questions – Who is in my small group? Who will be my leaders? Students were given a personalized journal. Inside the cover was a quote from the Bible. Students with the same quote gathered and then went on a search through



the meeting rooms to find the leaders with the same quote. After a few riotous moments, students and leaders were united. They were able to get acquainted and pray together for the first of what will be many times this school year.

SAS remembers Lt. Scott Lamana

On Sept. 11, 2001, Lieutenant Michael Scott Lamana, an alum of St. Aloysius School, lost his life when terrorists flew a jet plane into the Pentagon in Washington, D.C. The school recognizes his sacrifice each year by flying a special American flag donated to the school in Scott's honor.

This year, Scott's father, Mr. Mike Lamana, and his sister, Mrs. Andi Chatelain, joined the eighth-grade students for the special ceremony on Monday, Sept. 12. An honor guard of sev-

enth- and eighth-grade students, led by seventh-grade teacher and Army veteran Ms. Brandi Matthis, carried the flag from the general school assembly to the flagpole plaza in front of the school office. The honor guard solemnly unfolded the flag and raised it to full staff. Ms. Matthis gave a short explanation of the significance of the ritual. Then the honor guard lowered the flag to half-staff.

Father Nutan Minj, associate pastor, led the assembled group in prayer. The ceremony concluded with everyone reciting

the Pledge of Allegiance. Scott's flag was flown throughout the school day. At the end of the day, the honor guard returned to the flagpole to lower the flag and fold it. The flag was then returned to its place of honor in the school office.

Second-graders donate art supplies

The second-graders joined forces recently to sponsor a drive to collect art supplies for Our Lady of the Lake Children's Hospital. The second-graders encouraged the rest of the school to donate crayons, coloring books, activity books, markers and other art supplies. These supplies will be given to children who are patients in the hospital and to family members who are visiting them.

The collection began with the students being introduced to the project by their religion teacher, Ms. Jo Gomez. The students then colored posters advertising the dates of the collection. Collection boxes were placed on the stage of the Old Gym. On Thursday, Sept.

15, Mrs. Kleiner's homeroom class stayed in the gym after assembly to help sort the many items that had been collected.

On Friday, Sept. 16, representatives of the Junior League of Baton Rouge came to speak to the second-graders and pick up the donations. Jessica Guinn Johnson, Danelle Miller and Lakhetha Walker explained their program and thanked the students for their help. They answered questions from the interested students. At the end of the talk, Mrs. Kelley Thompson's class stayed to help with one final sorting of collected items.

Then, the second-graders assisted with loading the items into cars. Their helping hands made things move quickly. The items were organized and stored in the hospital. The final tally was 182 packs of crayons and coloring tools, 152 coloring books and activity books, as well as several large bags of loose crayons. A message to the St. Aloysius community from the Junior League, "Thank y'all so much! Our hearts and storage cabinets are overflowing!"

Special Needs

The St. Aloysius Parish Fair welcomes all visitors and prepares the fairground to accommodate guests with special needs. Fairgoers driving to the St. Aloysius Fair with authorized handicapped parking tags or license plates may park their vehicles within the grounds. The paved lot located on the east side of the church, where vehicles enter the grounds at Stuart Ave. and Orchid St., will have reserved handicapped spots.

In addition, a limited number of parking spaces for people with special needs and who have the proper hanging tags or license plates are available in the west school parking lot in front of the old gymnasium. This lot is accessible from Mimosa Street. People with special needs may park in any other lot open to the public.
