## St. Aloysius School shining brightly as new school year begins

This year marks the 65th anniversary of the founding of St. Aloysius School. The 2021-22 St. Aloysius School year is reflecting the theme "Be the Light." After dealing with the darkness of COVID-19, political unrest and financial stress, it is more important than ever to shine God's light in the world. The first two weeks of

August involved much training, preparation and logistics to safely bring together our faculty, parents and students.

In preparation for the school year, the teachers met for in-service days on Aug. 2-4. On Aug. 4, the faculty viewed a presentation on the history of St. Aloysius School. The focus was on the peo-

ple who used their light to guide the school in its present-day mission.

St. Louis, King of France, the patron of the Archdiocese of New Orleans; St. Ignatius of Loyola, the founder of the Jesuit Order; St. Aloysius, our patron; and St. Maria Candida de Jesus, the founder of the Daughters of Jesus, are some

of the canonized saints who have paved the way.

Other key individuals are Archbishop Joseph Rummel, who chartered our parish while it was still part of the Archdiocese of New Orleans; Monsignor Daniel Becnel, our first pastor; and Mrs. Floy Barrett, our first principal. Of course, we cannot forget the Daughters of

Jesus, whose more than 40 years of devoted ministry formed the foundation that makes St. Aloysius the excellent school that it is today.

Thursday, Aug. 5, kicked off the official start of the school year with the arrival of fifth- through eighth-graders on campus. As they arrived, students were welcomed



## Experience God in Prayer with study course

Do you find it easy to pray? Do you hear God's voice in your daily life and know how to respond? For most of us the answer is no, and we struggle to find even a few minutes every day to pray. The good news is that we can overcome these difficulties.

Our Adult Formation theme for 2021-2022 at St. Aloysius Church is "Experiencing God in Prayer." Beginning in mid-September, small groups meeting in-person and online will explore and experience the rich tradition of Catholic prayer through the Ascension Press study, "Oremus: A Guide to Catholic Prayer," by Father Mark Toups.

Spanning eight weeks, "Oremus" (Latin for "let us pray") teaches the essentials of an effective and fruitful prayer life and guides participants through

the simple yet profound steps of Catholic prayer.

Following Church Tradition and the wisdom of the Saints, we will learn to talk to God and hear his voice in Scripture, in the heart and in ordinary moments. We will become more aware of God's presence, will learn to overcome distractions and dryness, and will recognize desolation and consolation as normal prayer experiences. by an inflatable, waving "Big Al." The students exuded enthusiasm for the start of the year. Many practices of the past are once again allowed under our current COVID protocols, and students seemed very happy to have them back. Seventh- and eighth-grade students are allowed to gather on the sidewalk before the school day begins. Students are also allowed to change classes. Band and choir are meeting again.

Some adjustments have been made for safety this year. Students wear masks in the building and follow hand sanitizing protocols. During lunch periods, social

distancing measures are in place, having one grade eat lunch in the cafeteria while sitting in every other seat, as another grade eats in the Parish Hall with appropriate spacing between students.

On Friday, Aug. 6, first through fourth-graders spent their first day on campus. They were full of excitement and a bit of apprehension. The teachers met the students in their classrooms and walked them through their new routines. Students wore masks and observed hand-washing protocols. They also seemed happy at the end of the day and were ready for their first weekend break.

Monday, Aug. 9 was the first day that all first through eighth-graders were on campus together. At the same time, half of the kin-

dergarten and pre-kindergarten students were also present for their first day. The "big kids" reported to the Old Gym, New Gym and Middle School sidewalk. They were walked to the classroom by their parents. On Tuesday, Aug. 10, the other half of kindergarten and pre-k students arrived on campus.

Wednesday, Aug. 11, marked the first day all 1,165 students were on the school grounds. The teachers all pitched in to help students arrive at the right place, learn their routines and try to stay dry through afternoon thunderstorms.

The administration, faculty, students and parents of St. Aloysius School are all working together to "Be the Light" for each other this 2021-22 school year.

## 'Called by Name' WINE event inspires women

St. Aloysius was a vineyard on Saturday, July 24, ripened by the knowledge and wisdom of speakers from the second annual Women in the New Evangelization or "WINE" Conference.

Speakers included Kelly Wahlquist, foundress of WINE; Sonja Corbitt, a best-selling author and award-winning television and radio broadcaster; Erin Franco, guest speaker; and VaLlmar Jansen, who led praise and worship.

These women came prepared to inflame the hearts and minds of the more than 400 women who participated in the event here in the Diocese of Baton Rouge. The theme was "Called by Name," with St. Mary Magdalene as the patron saint of the event. Magdalene was called to be with Jesus during His passion, death and resurrection. In the Gospel of John, Chapter 20, it was she to whom Jesus identified Himself at the tomb.

The conference is held every two years, but because of COVID-19, official planning and preparation couldn't start until late April. WINE and the diocese collaborated on the event with St. Aloysius as the host. Parishioners stepped forward to take on the roles of the various job descriptions provided by WINE. Thanks to three months of hard work and by the grace of God, our campus was ready.

Heading committees from St. Aloysius were hospitality, Suzy Smith; decorations, Sheri Gillio; logistics, Scott Roussel and family; liturgy/confessions, Cheryl Frost and volunteers Georgette and Glynn Fontenot. Ronnie Haliburton, facility and maintenance manager, and his crew made sure the campus was prepared for participants. The ACTS men provided much assistance with any heavy lifting during the conference. There were also countless others not named here who helped with the process and event.

As Wahlquist said, "From the



viewpoint of the vendors, speakers and WINE, the short three months of planning yielded an abundance of fruit in hearts touched that day! The vendors were pleased with their interactions and sales, and the speakers were inspired and invigorated by the desire of the women to deepen their relationship with the Lord. This was evident not only in the comments heard after each talk, but in the lines for confession, the packed Adoration chapel, the number of women who went to the prayer teams, and the beautiful witness of women on their feet praising the Lord and dancing with joy—and yelling, "Here I am, Lord, pick me!"

The Marian Servants of the Eucharist volunteered to pray with participants.

"It was such a gift to serve as a prayer team minister during the conference," said Mary Tauzin, director of the Marian Servants of the Eucharist. "I was pleasantly surprised by the number of people who came for prayers and who came with such humility. I witnessed the Lord opening hearts for Him to love His children, to heal their wounds, and to give them consolation and encouragement, all according to His most perfect will."

"The Holy Spirit was alive and well at our WINE conference in the speakers, in the music, in the prayers, even in the shopping," said Lisette Borne, assistant director of the Marian Servants.



# Remembering Father Danny

Dear St. Aloysius Parishioners,  
It is with a deep sense of personal loss and grief that I confirm the unexpected and tragic death of Fr. Danny. I am sharing with you the following message from Bishop Duca:

31 August 2021

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

As your Bishop, it is with a heavy heart that I share with you news of Reverend Danny Roussel's death on August 30th. Fr. Danny was a deeply devoted priest who was beloved by his family, his parishioners, and his brother clergy. He shared a commitment to the faith that was clear and unwavering. I greatly appreciated Danny's generous and open-hearted service to our diocese.

I inform you with profound sorrow that Fr. Danny took his own life at the age of 49. We are aware that Danny recently struggled with anxiety and depression. For many people, the difficulties of the modern world can be an unbearable challenge. For some, these feelings can be overwhelming. I would ask you to pray for Father Danny, his mother, stepfather, brother, and family. Please also remember his Church families at Our Lady of Peace in Vacherie, St. Mary of False River in New Roads, St. Aloysius in Baton Rouge, and the larger diocesan Church family.

Brothers and sisters, news like this is troubling. If you are feeling overwhelmed, do not struggle alone. We must take care of one another, and we must also take care of our own mental health. If you are struggling to cope, do not hesitate to reach out to family and friends who love you, a pastor, or a licensed professional – someone to listen to you. You are not alone. Remember that our greatest source of strength and comfort is the mercy and love of God. Let us never waiver in these assurances of faith.



## Mother asks, 'What choice do I have but to trust God?'

In life, there are moments, events, things that leave you forever changed. Becoming pregnant was one of those events for me, as it is for many others. When you want something so badly and it happens, it feels like your whole existence is changed. Just as your existence can change with the good, the bad can also change you.

Shortly after things seemed perfect in my life, they were no longer. The words, "Your baby no longer has a heartbeat" are words that can never be erased from your mind. No matter how far along you are in a pregnancy, those words are devastating.

Never in my worst nightmares could I have imagined that I would not get to see my little girl live a full life. In the

days following our daughter's death, I wondered how I would ever go on; how God could have done this to me? And I longed to know why. What was the purpose of me getting pregnant and her dying? Why had God taken Anna from us?

Though I felt all alone, the reality is that one in four pregnancies ends in grief. Before we lost our daughter, I didn't realize that you could lose a baby after the first trimester. I had no idea that late-term losses occurred, yet here I was trying to process one.

I was changed because of it, because of her. I questioned everything, especially my faith. I realized quickly, though, that this was not God and I needed God. This horrific event was just something that happened, and that I, as a human, was not

equipped to truly understand. I felt like, what choice do I have but to trust God? I leaned on God and eventually realized that God will never leave me. He was here for me, helping me. God loves us unconditionally and will always be there for us, though sometimes it is hard for us to understand.

This time can be dark and lonely. For any other parent reading this, know that you are not alone. Though the journey is long and hard, there are many families around you who have experienced the same thing. St. Aloysius has a beautiful ministry called "Gentle Hands," for parents who have carried this cross as well. We are here to talk with you and to help. We also offer a prayer service and a retreat for families. Join us Friday, Oct. 1, for our memorial prayer service.
