St. Joseph's Altar at St. Aloysius brings parish together to honor saint

St. Aloysius Parish celebrated the Solemnity of St. Joseph on March 18-19 with a traditional St. Joseph's Altar.

The St. Joseph's Altar is an old practice long celebrated by Sicilians as a way of thanking the saint for his intercession in ending a drought that plagued the island centuries ago. Sicilians brought the altar tradition to southeast Louisiana in the late

1800s after settling here.

The afternoon of March 18, the altar opened to the public for viewing and a children's performance of the "Tupa Tupa" (Italian for "knock, knock") skit recounting the Holy Family going door to door knocking for shelter and food. Father Michael then said a prayer over the altar and blessed it with holy water. A delicious spaghetti dinner was prepared and served for everyone moments later in the Parish Hall.

On March 19, Mass was celebrated for the Solemnity of St. Joseph and afterward, viewing of the altar opened to the public.



Fill Up the Truck(s) event set for Saturday, April 12

It's BACK! Let's PACK! After a five-year hiatus since CO-VID, the St. Vincent de Paul Fill Up the Truck event is back.

St. Aloysius, in collaboration with St. Vincent de Paul, has planned for several large trucks to be parked in the church parking lot on Stuart Avenue near the football field on Saturday, April 12, from 8 AM to 4 PM. The goal: Fill up the trucks as much as possible and help our neighbors in need throughout the community.

You can help by prayerfully considering items to donate (new or used) and packing them up now. It's a great time for spring cleaning. We invite children, grandchildren, family, friends, co-workers, and neighbors to get involved. We extend the invitation to members of our parish ministries as well.

Items needed include furniture, women's and children's clothing, shoes and handbags, baby clothing, bicycles, toys, sheets, towels, pillows, bedspreads, small working appliances, books, lamps, pots, pans, dishes, utensils, and tools. (No mattresses, box springs, TVs, computers, gas or electric powered tools or lawn equipment. Also, due to federal regulations, SVdP is not able to accept baby cribs, car seats or highchairs.)

Newer clothing and shoes are more desirable because they can be used immediately. However, Your merciful generosity will be put to good use in helping so many within our community who need a helping hand and heart.

even worn-out clothes and shoes are acceptable because they can be sold for rags or recycled products. All donated items should be placed in plastic bags or boxes. Hanging clothes are welcome, but please cover these items. Larger items such as furniture or equipment do not need to be placed in bags or boxes.

Donated items can be claimed for income tax deductions. Volunteers from the St. Aloysius SVdP Conference will be on hand to assist you with receipts and to load up the truck from your vehicle.

As you know, after April 12, we move into Holy Week. Each year during Lent we're invited to deepen our commitment to Christ and to His community, the Church. Through scripture reading, prayer, fasting, almsgiving and service to the poor and others in need, we deepen our discipleship, following Jesus more closely and continuing His mission to build God's kingdom, in our-

selves, our families, our church and our communities.

The St. Aloysius Parish SVdP Fill Up the Truck(s) Drive helps us to be particularly mindful and merciful in reaching out to those in need while at the same time deepening our faith...our holiness as one in Christ.

These items are then distributed to the four SVdP Thrift Stores so that those in need may obtain goods for pennies on the dollar or so that the SVdP Church Conferences, such as St. Aloysius, may provide store vouchers to obtain these goods free of charge to our neighbors in need through our home visits program.

Their preparation paid off as they were able to approach the sacrament with open hearts, trusting in the peace and joy that reconciliation brings.

Baby Bottle Campaign 2025 a Huge Success

The Dignity of Life Committee of St. Aloysius and the Knights of Columbus, Council 3743, proudly support two lifesaving centers: The Pregnancy Problem Center located on Florida Street, and the Woman's New Life Center, located on Colonial Drive.


Part of that support is the annual Baby Bottle Campaign, which was a huge success again this year. Parishioners gave generously, with a total over \$16,000, which led to gifts to over \$8,000

to each center.

Both centers have been giving women in crisis pregnancies an alternative to abortion for many years, saving many babies in the process and their mothers from such a nightmare. Both have free pregnancy tests and ultrasound machines, so mothers can see their babies in the womb.

The PPC has a "Mom and Me Shop" to clothe and feed both moms and babies and also offers an "Earn to Learn" program that helps moms and dads become better parents with healthier babies. The Woman's New Life Center offers professional counseling, educational resources and post abortion counseling. They also teach Natural Family Planning.

The cost of running these centers is expensive, but you cannot put a price tag on the lives and souls saved. Our committee and the K.C. want to thank you for your generous support for life.







SAS retreat challenges, teaches fifth graders

The students not only experienced these great activities, they also ended the day with Deacon Don Allison in prayerful Adoration.
