Father Randy honored during Veterans Week

Father Randy was recognized at the Baton Rouge Metro Council's meeting on Nov. 8 for his service as a veteran. The presentation honored several veterans for their service as part of Veterans Week in the city-parish.

Rowdy Gaudet, District 3 councilman and St. Aloysius parishioner, introduced Father Randy to the council and presented him with a certificate of appreciation.

Father Randy served in the

U.S. Air Force Reserve Chaplaincy for 30 years, retiring with the rank of colonel in 2009. He was a member of the Reserve Chaplain Core Council, Reserve Chaplain Core Force Development Team and Reserve Chaplain Recruiting Team.

He was embedded in combat zones for two deployments in 2004 and 2006 with the U.S. Army and Marines in Afghanistan during Operation Enduring Freedom.



'A great act of holiness'

Remaining in Christ through prayer

When we read about the lives of saints, it can give us inspiration and guidance on how we, too, can one day become saints. One necessary component of the path to sainthood is an active prayer life.

St. Aloysius of Gonzaga, our parish's namesake, once said, "He who is not a man of prayer will never attain to a great act of holiness, nor will he ever triumph over himself." Though St. Aloysius did not live a long life (he died at the age of 23), he was known for his devotion to prayer, which he began practicing in early childhood.



Prayer took many forms for St. Aloysius. He prayed with the Psalms, attended daily Mass, received weekly communion, regularly fasted, studied theology and engaged in meditation. According to Father John A. Hardon, SJ, St. Aloysius' contemporaries attested that he would often meditate on God's goodness, wisdom and beauty, and that doing this would bring him great joy.

All of St. Aloysius' time in prayer and faith study led to great fruit through his work with The Society of Jesus (Jesuits), service to the poor and sick during a plague in Rome, and ultimately, canonization!

Our Stewardship Through Prayer Committee invites parishioners to recommit to growing closer to God through personal prayer, community worship and spiritual formation. Though we are all called to be saints, our prayer lives

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Beloved antique St. Aloysius holy water reservoir restored

The holy water reservoir that served our old church (now Parish Hall) since it was built in 1956 was recovered several years ago from the church's storage loft by life-long parishioner Joanne Roberts during the course of her ministry work.

When she showed it to Father Randy, he well remembered it from his childhood days at Aloysius. It had always been situated in the vestibule of the church under the stairway to the choir loft, conveniently located so parishioners and visitors could re-fill their holy water bottles as needed.

When the new church was completed, it was no longer needed because holy water bottles could be re-filled from the holy water pool in the rear of the new church.

However, the reservoir was very sentimental to Joanne. Her dad was a faithful usher at the 9 AM Mass in the old church for years. Every Sunday he would bring Joanne and her sister Ellen to Mass, seating them in the choir loft so that he could keep his eye on them while he was ushering.

She had to pass by that reservoir both on her way up to, and on her way down from the choir loft every Sunday. It was likely with holy water from this reservoir that both Joanne and Father Randy were baptized.

Father Randy was happy to support Joanne's desire to have the reservoir restored, and she set about the effort. While doing so, it came to her attention that another long-time parishioner, Dr. George Karam, was a recognized expert in the restoration of antique copper artifacts as a hobby. When he saw it, he immediately recognized the



reservoir as an 'exquisite' antique.

It is not known yet how or from whom our founding pastor, Monsignor Daniel Becnel, acquired the antique reservoir for St. Aloysius' original church building. The newly restored reservoir is now located in the lobby of the Pastoral Services Center building, where parishioners are welcome to visit during business hours to refill their holy water bottles at times when they are otherwise unable to access the church's baptismal pool.

do not need to exactly mimic the prayer life of St. Aloysius. We each must reflect on and discern how God is inviting us to spend time in relationship with Him.

In John 15:4, Jesus says, "Remain in me as I remain in you. Just as a branch cannot bear fruit on its own unless it remains on the vine, so neither can you unless you remain in me." We can 'remain in Him' through devoting daily time to prayer and actively growing in knowledge of our faith, intentionally working to gain a greater understanding of the Holy

Scriptures and of our Catholic traditions and teachings.

We don't have to always pray and study our faith in solitude. St. Aloysius Parish offers several opportunities to deepen prayer life in community with fellow parishioners in Bible study groups, weekly and monthly Adoration, and regular program offerings and speakers. In short, like all relationships, our relationship with Jesus requires ongoing and consistent communication. It is only with consistent prayer that we can see what God is doing in us and

through us, and to discover how to continuously live the life He calls us towards.

Let us Remain in Him and love God by growing our faith through prayer. Let us also lean on the intercession of St. Aloysius as we work to increase our dedication to prayer in our lives. St. Aloysius, pray for us!

Aguillard to retire from Catholic Charities

David C. Aguillard will step down as executive director of Catholic Charities of the Diocese of Baton Rouge effective June 30, 2024, Bishop Michael G. Duca announced Oct. 6. Aguillard, a St. Aloysius parishioner, has served in the role for 15 years.

“David brought energy, creativity and an unwavering commitment to our Catholic mission of service to people living in poverty throughout our diocese,” Bishop Duca said. “While he will be missed, our commitment to the traditional and newly emerging services of Catholic Charities remains steadfast.”

Aguillard said, “This work has brought me more joy than I ever thought professionally possible because of the support of the community and my colleagues at the agency. Their generosity and talents propelled us to amazing accomplishments. Their tenacious spirit carried us through the challenges of COVID, hurricanes, floods and

economic downturns. In fact, these challenges served as springboards that lifted us to higher levels of service.”

Bishop Duca noted that during Aguillard’s remaining time at the agency he will continue his efforts to build and hopefully expand the new food-distribution program to reach underserved rural areas of the diocese.

A nationwide search will be launched to identify Aguillard’s successor.

During Aguillard’s tenure, CCDBR became a national leader in long-term recovery and implemented new programs in early-childhood education. He expanded the agency’s accommodations for homeless pregnant women, the Sanctuary for Life,

from housing two women to eight women and their infants.

The agency also responded to international events, welcoming Ukrainians and Afghans most recently and asylum seekers from around the world.

“I’ve always said that if you want to know who is suffering on our planet, just walk into your local Catholic Charities office,” Aguillard said. “The world’s pain walks daily through our doors. Serving them is our Gospel privilege and a necessity for followers of Christ.”

Aguillard said he doesn’t have any specific plans yet, and is hesitant to use the word “retire,” because he enjoys community service. In the near term, he wants to spend time with his adult children, engaging in the vigorous outdoor adventures they enjoy together. “I’m never happier than when I’m with my children, backpacking into wild landscapes and scrambling up

mountain peaks. We want more time together...while I’m still – almost – capable of keeping up,” he said.

Bishop-Emeritus Robert W. Muench appointed Aguillard to his leadership post in October 2008. Before joining the agency, he served as president and CEO of Lake Physician Health Organization. Prior to that, he worked for the state of Missouri implementing parenting programs, health care and welfare reform initiatives and was detailed by the governor to serve as director of a presidential commission on urban poverty.

Earlier in his career, Aguillard was an award-winning journalist, reporting for the St. Louis Post-Dispatch, the Pittsburgh Press, Ann Arbor News and the Times-Picayune.

and the Scouts found many patients had dietary restrictions. Pack 7 then had the idea to give the gift bags to the rehab staff – nurses, physical therapist, speech therapists who care for the patients.

The service project became “caring for those who care for the sick.” 50 bags were stuffed at St. Aloysius on Oct. 8, then delivered to Our Lady of the Lake on Oct. 13. The rehab staff was extremely touched and thankful with smiles all around.

Pack 7 will be honored for the recognition at a ceremony in August 2024 where Bishop Michael Duca will present medals to the group.
